This guide is intended to help you make the most of your studies, and to help you build your professional future.

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DISABILITY TYPOLOGY



Visual impairment

Sensory disability:

"A visual disorder, in various forms, most often progressive, affects visual acuity and/or the visual field." (Blind and partially sighted people).

Hearing impairment

Sensory disability:

"Full hearing loss is rare. As with visual impairment, most hearing-impaired people have "residual hearing", which can be significantly amplified by hearing aids. In some cases, this disability may or may not be accompanied by difficulty in speaking".

Motor disabilities

"Motor disorders are physical alterations other than sensory ones that result in functional limitations in the coordination of movements, speech, mobility and dexterity."

Visceral disorders or disabling illnesses

These are "chronic (permanent) or acute disorders that are likely to affect life in society".

Examples:

"respiratory, digestive, parasitic and infectious diseases."

Mental disability

"It is a difficulty in understanding and a limited speed of the mental functions regarding comprehension, knowledge and cognition."

Autism

"A complex neurodevelopmental disorder that belongs to the Pervasive Developmental Disorders (PDD) and lasts for the whole of life. It is caused by a neurobiological dysfunction that affects communication skills and social interactions."

DYS disorders

Cognitive disorders: *"DYS disorders can be defined as specific learning disorders that are severe and long-lasting, without sensory or intellectual impairment."*
Developmental disorders: these affect both children and adults.

Cognitive impairment

Substantial, lasting or permanent impairment of one or more cognitive functions arising from a cerebral dysfunction. They may be specific, developmental and/or acquired, invasive or progressive.

Examples:

"Disorders related to attention, memory, adaptation to change, language, perceptual identifications (gnosias) and gestures (praxias)".

Mental disorder

"There is no exhaustive definition, especially since psychiatric terminology (neurosis, psychosis, etc.) is only mastered by psychiatrists. However, people with mental health problems suffer from a sense of unease that can, at times, result in behavior that is confusing for other people because it deviates from conventional and usual behavior."

RIGHTS FOR STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES

The law of February 11, 2005 introduced the “right to compensation” principle

“Disabled persons are entitled to compensation for the consequences of their disability, regardless of the origin and nature of their disability, their age or their lifestyle.”

A compensatory measure is not a bonus, but an adaptation to meet a need to offset the consequences of a disorder that creates a situation of disability in a specific circumstance. This procedure is designed to restore equal opportunities.

In higher education, material or human compensation is not automatic; it is based on steps and procedures that need to be anticipated.

Principle of accessibility and right to compensation

“Higher education institutions have a responsibility to ensure that people with disabilities have access to the teaching, facilities, services and assistance they require to pursue their studies, regardless of their disability”.

(Practical guide from the Conférence des Grandes Ecoles)

DISABILITY LIAISON OFFICERS

Disability liaison officers provide support for students with disabilities. They meet them individually by appointment.



Nurse

The nurse's role is to determine your needs, inform you of any special arrangements linked to your studies, and explain the resources deployed by the School to facilitate your educational experience. She is in direct contact with the Prevention Doctor.



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The Diversity Manager

The Diversity Manager acts as a link between all campus departments and coordinates the implementation of disability-related measures.

The disability liaison officers work with the School staff to make sure that students have all the information and support they need to complete their studies in the best possible conditions, including information on:

- > The accessibility of the premises,
- > The assistance with administrative formalities,
- > The help provided to ensure a smooth learning experience including material installation, adaptation of teaching equipment, support in obtaining human assistance (note taker, sign language interpreter, speech coder, etc.) or material assistance,
- > The specific arrangements for examinations,
- > The financial aid available,
- > The internship and job offers.

In regular contact with associations working on disability issues in the Grandes Ecoles, they forward information on disability-related events and meetings.

In addition to the School being a member of IMT, which is deploying an ambitious disability strategy, effective work is being carried out in collaboration with associations and networks such as the Conférence des Grandes Écoles (CGE).

COMPENSATION RIGHTS AND EDUCATIONAL ADJUSTMENTS

The procedure

The disability liaison officers help students build their study plans. Enrolling at a Grande Ecole often implies a change of environment, requiring adaptation that it is important to anticipate. Student autonomy remains at the heart of the School's actions and schemes.

If you are disabled, it is important to make yourself known.

1. As soon as you have registered, you must contact the disability liaison officers by sending an e-mail to handicap@imt-bs.eu with the "Declaration of disability and/or request for teaching adaptations" form (document to be downloaded from the [disability page](#) of Institut Mines-Telecom Business School's website.)
2. On receipt of this declaration, you will be given an appointment with the MDPH-approved prevention doctor. He/she will assess your situation and will recommend the compensatory measures required to ensure that your studies run smoothly.

3. The file containing the proposed educational adjustments, validated by the doctor, will be sent to the Registrar's Office.
4. The Registrar's Office will notify you of the adjustments that will be implemented within 15 days.

If you do not agree with the decisions taken and/or the proposed adjustments, you may lodge an appeal with the School's Department for Undergraduate and Graduate Education, within 15 days of receiving the decision from the Program Director.

Any decision to make adjustments, whether for studies or examinations, must be organized in advance. Proposals for adaptations must therefore reach the Registrar's Office and the program team three weeks before their implementation. It is the responsibility of the students benefiting from these arrangements to be aware of these deadlines.

To support you, our disability liaison officers coordinate the implementation and monitoring of human and technical aids, in conjunction with the relevant departments and professors. Arrangements are made for **one academic year**.

Your application must be renewed at the beginning of each academic year to ensure that your file is updated. At your request, you may be offered a specific follow-up to check the relevance of the adaptations and readjust them if necessary.

For temporary disabilities due to an accident or illness, the procedure is the same.

Any disability situation arising during the year will be brought to the knowledge of the disability liaison officers.

ACCESSIBILITY

At Institut Mines-Telecom Business School

Since 2011, the campus has benefited from infrastructure that complies with accessibility standards, allowing people with disabilities to move autonomously around the campus.

IMT-BS regularly renovates its premises to better accommodate students with disabilities. You will find many different types of accessibility equipment such as ramps, elevators, and reserved parking spaces.

However, not all campus buildings have the same level of accessibility. If you have a problem with accessibility, please contact one of our disability liaison officers who can give you advice and support to help you achieve greater autonomy.

- > Created by the city of Boulogne-Billancourt in 2005, the BNH is a national platform providing access to digital and audio books for people with disabilities.

Accessible locations in Evry-Courcouronnes and in France

The Evry-Courcouronnes town hall has set up a municipal commission for accessibility. The town also has adopted a Disability Charter.

To check whether a location is accessible, the jaccede.com website allows you to verify the accessibility of all types of locations in France, or to identify accessible places in your town.

COURSE ADAPTATIONS

This list is provided as a reference only and is not exhaustive. It will be studied according to your situation and the possibilities offered by the program.

- › Lending of machines or technical or IT equipment, such as a laptop, may be loaned on an occasional basis, solely for use on school premises, and only in connection with schoolwork.
- › Attendance waiver
- › Extension of the study period
- › Course rescheduling
- › Document adaptation
- › Note-taking (transmission of courses by computer/ courses on Moodle)
- › Educational tutoring (on the advice of the Program Director and the coordinating professor)
- › School tutoring
- › Material support for a communication mode

EXAM ADAPTATIONS

Based on a certificate issued by a doctor appointed by the MDPH (Maison Départementale des Personnes Handicapées - French Departmental House for the Disabled), the disability liaison officers propose the necessary adaptations, in collaboration with the professors and the administration team.

The main examination adaptations

- › Access to the premises
- › Material installation in the exam room
- › Use of technical or IT equipment, indicating the nature and purpose of these technical aids (e.g. loan of a computer)
- › Secretariat (the secretary writes on the student's dictation), indicating the nature, purpose and duration of these human aids
- › Adaptation of the presentation of subjects (paper or digital format compatible with the equipment used by the candidate, enlargement of subjects, adaptation of color contrasts, etc.)
- › Additional time for writing the exam, indicating the type of test concerned (written, oral, practical, etc.)
- › Any other measures deemed useful by the MDPH-certified physician

The special adaptations

- › Adaptation of the nature of the test or substitute test depending on the possibilities authorized by the examination regulations
- › Exemption from a test or part of a test depending on the possibilities authorized by the examination regulations
- › Spreading of exams in the same year over both the normal session and the replacement session when an exam includes replacement exams

The possible adaptations based on the type of disability

Non-exhaustive list provided as a reference only

Visual impairment

Braille examination subjects, large-print adaptation, use of special color codes, voice synthesis, examination secretary, image description, diagram dispensation, additional time, isolated room

Hearing impairment

One of the communication methods the candidate is used to (lip-reading, French sign language interpreter (LSF), completed spoken language coder, extra time, exemption from foreign language oral test)

Motor disabilities

Premises accessibility, a computer can be made available (adapted keyboards, trackball, joystick, key cover, adapted interface), extra time and examination secretary

Mental disability

Additional time, independent room

Mental disorder

Additional time, independent room and possibility of leaving the room during the test

Cognitive disorders (including DYS)

Examination secretary, additional time, equipment such as a computer with correction software

Disabling illnesses

Authorization to leave the room during the test, additional time

FINANCIAL AID AND BENEFITS

Relating to your studies
at Institut Mines-Telecom Business School

For compensation strictly related to your studies, you should contact the disability liaison officers and the social worker.

For compensation related to daily life, you need to contact the MDPH office in your department.

However, these grants are not automatic: Students are responsible for making the necessary formalities with their School's disability liaison officers or the MDPH of their department, depending on the type of request. In the latter case, support can be offered.



Partners helping to finance studies

FEDEEH scholarships

These scholarships are designed to help students with disabilities to pursue their studies in the best possible conditions. The scope of application is quite broad. These grants can finance the purchase of equipment, an academic exchange abroad, a Braille keyboard, etc.

Company scholarships

Many companies offer scholarships or grants to students with disabilities.

The disability liaison officers regularly share proposals from the School's partner companies.

These companies offer a wide range of internships, work-study placements and jobs.

Services such as personal assistance, note-takers or exam secretaries can also be financed.

Institut Mines Telecom scholarship holder

As with the **CROUS** system, there are exceptions to take disability into account. The age limit for applying for a grant does not apply to disabled students, who benefit from three additional annual allowances.

Apprentices

Your employer must enable you to carry out your missions in the best possible conditions, in particular by facilitating the implementation of special arrangements.

Agefiph and **FIPHFP** provide financial aid for disabled students on work-study contracts.

The age limit for apprenticeships is not applicable to disabled students.

STUDYING ABROAD

WITH A DISABILITY

International mobility is a legitimate and necessary ambition for students enrolled in the Integrated Master in Management and the Bachelor programs. It requires preparation, in collaboration with the Department for International Relations and Development.

Before departure, you will need to take the following precautions:

- > If you need treatment, your referring doctor will look into access to similar care in the host country (medication, examination and follow-up).
- > You should also closely examine the guarantees offered by insurance contracts (repatriation, reimbursement of medical expenses, etc.).
- > It is important to contact the disability liaison officer at your host institution or the academic department to make sure that you will be staying in the best possible conditions (course of study, assessment, accommodation and transport).
- > It is essential to plan precisely how this mobility will be financed as the additional costs can be significant. Grants and subsidies are available (complementary mobility aid from Erasmus+, grants from local authorities, etc.).

Follow-up is offered throughout the international mobility period.

International students with disabilities living on campus are also invited to get in touch with the disability liaison officers.

Student associations such as **FÉDÉEH**, **Handinamique**, **Arpejeh**, **Apaches** and **Handisup** can support disabled students financially in their international mobility projects.

FÉDÉEH: The FÉDÉEH is a national solidarity network whose mission is to improve educational and professional integration conditions for young people with disabilities through long-term student involvement.

LADAPT: This association supports disabled people in their daily personal and professional lives. It comprises 109 centers and services for support, training, integration, education and care.

During the year, you will also be invited to submit your CVs and cover letters to the disability units of our partner companies. Do not hesitate to go to the Career Center, which will advise you and put you in contact with various people from the business world.

Companies in favor of a disability policy

Some companies show a commitment to disability and a real willingness to integrate people with disabilities. It may be a good idea for you to target those companies if they have a job that matches your profile and send your resume directly to them. These companies will be more sensitive to your problems and more familiar with possible adaptation solutions.

Beneficiaries of the obligation to employ disabled workers (BOETH)

To be recognized as disabled by a company, it is advisable to be a beneficiary of the obligation to employ disabled workers (BOETH).

To do so, you must either:

- Be **recognized as a disabled worker (RQTH status)**. You need to submit an application to the MDPH; the disability liaison officers and the social assistant can help you.
- Have a pension or disability card.
- Receive the disabled adult allowance (AAH).

The **RQTH** status helps your employer and the other employees to understand your situation, and makes them aware of the difficulties you may be experiencing. When a disability is not explained to the professional environment, it can be misinterpreted and misjudged. In fact, it is not a question of incompetence, but of incapacity due to a disability.

In addition, uncompensated hardship at work should not penalize your health. The employer must enable you to carry out your job. The **RQTH** gives employees rights, but also benefits for employers. You can benefit from special adaptations to compensate for your disability (e.g. an adapted computer), as well as mobility assistance to travel to your workplace. Employers may be eligible for a deduction from their employment obligation, or for assistance from other organizations (AGEFIPH, FIFHP).

For internships, the **RQTH** status is recognized by the employer, while other forms of recognition, such as the PCH (disability compensation benefit), are “equivalent” to the RQTH).

Please note that the status of disabled student does not currently exist.

Finally, the **RQTH** status allows you to apply for jobs published on general sites as well as on specialized sites.

Only you can decide whether or not to disclose your disability on your resume and in your job. The decision is yours.

To find out how to deal with your disability on your resume, when applying for a job or in the workplace, you can consult the Institut Mines-Telecom Business School's disability liaison officers and the Career Center, who will help you define your career plan and carry out your research.

You can also get very good advice from the association FÉDÉEH and the members of its network (students and young graduates with disabilities).

Attention

The **RQTH** is a lengthy process, so you need to plan ahead. You will then decide whether or not to tell your employer that you are a beneficiary and whether or not to send them a copy. It may therefore be worth applying for it, so that you can use it when you feel the time is right. It is valid for a limited period of time (generally between 1 and 10 years).

Complementary health insurance recommended

You can be affiliated with any health insurance provider. You may even be eligible for that of your parents.

Specific complementary organizations

This list is not exhaustive. Most mutual insurance companies include disability in their benefits.

- > **Intégrance:** National health insurance for disabled people, their families and social workers.
- > **Handi-assur:** Insurance company offering specific supplementary health insurance, especially for real estate loans.

From August 1, 2019, all students will be covered by the Caisse Primaire d'Assurance Maladie of their place of residence.

Student health insurance companies such as **LMDE**, **SMEREP** and **HEYME** are pursuing their prevention initiatives and continue to offer optional supplementary and fee-paying health cover, specifically adapted to students.



FINANCIAL AID AND BENEFITS

to help students in their daily lives

Disabled adult allowance (AAH)

The Disabled Adult Allowance (AAH) provides financial aid to ensure a minimum income. This aid is granted under the condition that four criteria are met: disability, age, nationality and resources.

Conditions:

- A disability rate calculated by the CDAPH (Commission des droits et de l'autonomie des personnes handicapées - Commission for the Rights and Autonomy of Disabled Persons)
- Be at least 20 years old, or between 16 and 20 if you are no longer dependent on your parents
- Resources may not exceed a certain amount

The request must be sent to the MDPH office by registered post with acknowledgement of receipt. The reply is due within 4 months.

Disability cards

Inclusion Mobility Card (CMI)

It is issued to anyone with a permanent disability of 80% or more. It gives priority seating on public transportation and in public facilities and queues.

Inclusion Mobility Card for Parking

It entitles the holder to park free of charge and for an unlimited period of time in all public parking spaces (including those not reserved for disabled persons).

You can apply for this card at the MDPH office in your department. The form can be downloaded from the public service website.

Disability compensation allowance (PCH)

Assistance with daily activities is part of the compensation plan, but the School does not bear the cost, it is the MDPH's area of responsibility. This aid covers human assistance, material assistance (home and vehicle adaptations) and animal assistance. Together with the student, the MDPH (Departmental House for the Disabled) draws up a personalized plan to meet the student's needs based on his/her life project. Disability liaison officers facilitate contacts with the MDPH.

TRANSPORT

Financing your transportation to school

Most often, funding is provided by the Conseil Général of the home department via the **Maison Départementale des Personnes Handicapées (MDPH - Departmental House for the Disabled)**.

For personalized advice, students may directly contact the disability liaison officers or the MPDH. The Conseil Général covers the cost of one return trip per day and per academic year between the student's usual place of residence and the school.

Accès Plus service by SNCF

The SNCF is present on various networks, among which the RER D, which is the closest RER line to the campus. The “Evry-Courcouronnes” RER D station is equipped with an elevator and offers an assistance to the train to all disabled people.

Accès Plus is a free service that consists in welcoming disabled and reduced-mobility passengers at the station and accompanying them to their seat on the train.

This service offers the possibility of:

- > buying tickets adapted to your situation
- > booking your welcome services at the station and assistance getting on and off the train (Accès Plus is in no way an escort service during the trip)
- > accessing the information you need to make your trip as smooth as possible.

RATP

List of accessible buses: All bus lines in Paris are accessible, with wheelchair accessible stops. In the suburbs, 170 lines are accessible. Buses are also equipped with acoustic and visual signals. In addition, three night buses, called Noctiliens, are accessible.

RER and transilien stations equipped: Most RER stations are adapted for disabled people.

Accessible metro stations: only line 14 is fully accessible.

Accessible tramway stations: tramways have been designed to be accessible.

CATERING

At Institut Mines-Telecom Business School, the campus restaurant is accessible to people with reduced mobility and has been designed to adapt to their needs. The cafeteria is equipped with microwaves and accessible tables. Product composition (lactose, gluten) is available on request. Special dishes for people with food allergies are also available on request. People on a strict diet can bring their own packed lunch to the restaurant with a doctor's prescription.

HOUSING

Housing on campus at the MAISEL

Students with disabilities have priority access to housing at the Maison des Elèves (MAISEL) on the School campus. It is necessary to reserve accommodation as soon as possible and to inform the MAISEL.

9 of the units are accessible to people with disabilities. They are located in buildings U1 (1 unit), U3 (2 units), U5 (4 units) and U7 (2 units).

Please note that in order to request a room at the CROUS, students with a disability recognized by the MDPH must submit an application between January 15 and May 31. Rooms in Evry-Courcouronnes are managed by the CROUS of Versailles.
